

The school board has been extremely busy this year making plans concerning the construction of an addition to the high school and a new elementary school. The addition to the high school will include a large, modern gymnasium and five much-needed classrooms. The new elementary school, which will be named Patterson School, will be ready for use in September. In addition to seven classrooms, it will include a library and gymnasium. The cost of both the addition and the elementary building will be approximately \$760,000.

The second year there were eighty-two members in our band. Bill Beardsley climbed into the driver's seat of the lead wagon, and Melvin Boltz was his assistant. Irma Broillier assumed the duty of keeping the diary and Joan Pfaus continued looking after our growing treasury. Bob Binns, Merlyn Wagner, and Sally Rentschler were our representatives to the joint meetings held with other wagon trains. Our guides for this year were Miss Hanchon and Mr. Murdoch. We were now familiar with the hazards of the trail, and therefore we eagerly looked forward to the coming events. Besides the usual activities, our class sponsored numerous bake sales and two skating parties. In December our class rings arrived. We were very happy because we were the first class in Tecumseh to purchase rings in the Sophomore year. After our Christmas Party, the next big event was the May Dance. Shirley Van Hook and Jack Betzoldt were our representatives to the Royal Court at the May Dance. This completed the year's activities.

By our Junior year we had survived the hardships of the trail thus far, and we began to feel confident that we would safely reach our goal. We chose as our wagon master Tom Naser, who was assisted by Jim Fielder. Irma Brollier and Joan Pfaus continued their postions as secretary and treausurer, respectively. Our representatives to the Council were Marian Titley, Melvin Boltz, and Merlyn Wagner. Mr. Murdock assumed the individual responsibility of guiding us this year. We now began to think about the activities which our class must soon sponsor, such as the Junior-Senior Reception. Therefore, we participated in many money making projects—paper drives, the sale of baked goods, magazines, school sweatshirts and stationery. The concessions which we operated at the carnival this year included a refreshment stand, archery range, a fun house and a dart stand, all of which were successful. Later in the season our class presented "Footloose", a three-act comedy. Seniors and Juniors alike enjoyed the picturesque setting of the Country Club for the traditional Junior-Senior Reception. The formal May Dance concluded another busy year.

In this, our Senior year, our activities along the trail have increased rapidly. Sixty-nine Seniors started the year by electing Jack Betzoldt head engineer. John Deming was his right-hand man. Joan Pfaus and Irma Brollier were once again re-elected to the offices of treasurer and secretary. Melvin Boltz, Marian Titiey, and Bob Binns ably represented us on the Council. In addition, the Seniors had a fourth member on the Council, Merlyn Wagner, who served as President. Mrs. Macbeth became our adviser.

We soon began preparing for our Senior trip by repeating most of the money-making activities of our Junior year. In addition we sold pencils, Christmas cards, ribbon and alloccasion cards. Our Senior play, "The Man Who Came to Dinner", was a credit to our class.

Later, we participated in the Homecoming activities and attended the Christmas Dance. Again this year the girls entertained the boys during Sponge Week. In May, we embarked on our Senior trip to New York City for five joyful days. We saw the sights of the big city, including the great White Way. We returned, tired but still excited, to find ourselves nearing the end of the trail of T. H. S. Then came the lovely Junior-Senior Reception, at which the Seniors were unusually quiet.

FOOTBALL

With the opening of the 1952 football season, Coach Lawson started his first year of coaching in Tecumseh as head football coach, with Mr. Murdoch as assistant coach.

The team opened the season at Monroe Catholic Central and dropped their first Southeastern League game by a 26 to 6 margin.

After an open date, the Indians met Hudson in a nonleague tilt and were defeated 14 to 9 when Hudson scored twice in the final period.

Next, Tecumseh played by far their best game of the season against the Morenci Bulldogs. The Indians came out on the short end of a 19 to 14 score when Morenci scored late in the fourth quarter. Morenci knew that they had been in a battle, because the Indians were really 'up' for the contest. The blocking and tackling of the team was very good, but the defeat was costly, as several key players were injured in the contest.

The next game was at Bedford, where the Indians suffered a humiliating 59 to 7 defeat.

Our team lost their third and last conference game when Hillsdale defeated them here, 26 to 13.

The rest of the season was one of defeats, as Clinton won in the dying seconds of the game, 20 to 13; Addison won, 14 to 6; and Blissfield administered a 26 to 6 defeat.

Injuries to several key players hampered the Indians, but many underclassmen were able to gain some valuable game experience, which may make them of greater value to the team next year.

The following Seniors received Varsity Letters:

Captain Bob Binns—Playing his first year as a regular, he was very valuable, as he was used in many different positions, both on the line and in the backfield and also did most of the kicking. Bob has won three Varsity football letters.

Lynn Hunt—The other three-year man on the squad and a hard driving fullback on offense and linebacker on defense.

Jack Greenwald—A glue-fingered end who played well on both offense and defense until injured midway in the season.

Bill Beardsley—Another "Jack of all trades" who did a good job on both offense and defense until injured.

Melvin Boltz—A tackle used mostly on offense, but able to play defense when called upon.

Jack Betzoldt—Playing any position in the backfield on either offense or defense.

Jim Stutesman—A first year letter-winner, but one of the hardest workers on the squad, both on offense and defense from his quard position.

Bill Starkey—A hard-hitting guard, who played regularly until injured early in the season.

Underclassmen who were awarded Varsity Letters were:

Tom Baldwin—A small but rugged guard, used mostly on defense.

Bill Benham—At his best, a triple-threat back in the open field. Bill played both offense and defense until injured, and led the team in scoring.

Bob Benham—(Known to the players as "little Benham"). Played mostly on defense and was one of two freshmen to letter.

Jim Bowser—A Sophomore end, used both on offense and defense.

Roger Butler—A hard-charging tackle, used on both offense and defense.

Albert Hart—A halfback on both offense and defense, who also did a good job punting.

Doug Hooton—An end, used on both offense and defense. Carl Henkel—One of the offensive centers and a back on defense.

Alroy Vanderpool—An offensive quarterback until injured early in season. Played mostly defense after recuperating.

Marvin Yoakum—Played in the line of offense and as line-backer on defense.



VARSITY BASKETBALL

The 1952-1953 basketball season was a great one for Tecumseh. The Indians, composed of a well-balanced and well-organized outfit, captured their league crown for the third consecutive year. Many doubted the power of the Indians during the early stages of the season, for Tecumseh, with only four returning lettermen, was up against tough teams and a tough brand of ball in their newly organized Southeastern Michigan Conference "Class B" League. But our school, under the guidance of our new coach, Vic Lawson, surprised all pessimists by not only winning the League title with a 6-O record, but also turning in an overall season's record of 15 wins and 1 loss.

The Indians opened their campaign with a non-league battle against Addison. Tecumseh, after having a sizable lead throughout most of the game, had to turn on the power in the last quarter to stop a stubborn Addison five, 56-50.

The following week the Indians were host to Hillsdale, a top contender for the Southeastern Conference title. In a real thriller, we nosed out the Hornets, 38-34.

Later in the same week the Bulldogs of Morenci invaded Tecumseh. Fired up after two consecutive victories, the Läwson men rolled over Morenci, 67-50.

When the Indians met Clinton only four days later, they figured this game to be a breather. The Redskins, however, surprised our boys, who had to come from behind in the fourth quarter to slip past them, 49-41.

After a two-and-a-half week lay-off for Christmas vacation, the Indians met another league opponent in Monroe Catholic Central, silencing them in a low scoring contest, 39-23. Hudson was next to fall to the powerful Indians, 58-33. This made it six straight for our boys.

Blissfield was the Tecumsehites' biggest test. Both teams led their respective leagues at this point in the season. But Tecumseh proved to be the superior of the two and gave the Sugarboys a 61-44 drubbing. Tecumseh's eighth straight victim was a Bedford five. The

Indians had no easy time in this conference game, but managed to register a 32-25 victory.

In the final week of January, T.H.S. ran into two of their toughest opponents as the second round of the season began. Nevertheless, they won numbers nine and ten. Addison fell, 55-33, and then Hillsdale, 53-45, in a thriller.

The Indians finally had a bad night when they met Morenci on Morenci's court. The Bulldogs led all the way as they set back our boys, 60-51, for their only defeat of the season.

After this defeat, Tecumseh settled down and went on to win their remaining five games. Clinton fell, 68-51, in a game which saw Tecumseh forward Jim Wilson score 33 points for a new individual scoring record in the T.H.S. gym. Lawson's cagers had even an easier time against Hudson and Blissfield. The Indians rolled over them by respective scores of 64-48 and 63-45.

The last week of the season found Tecumseh up against two tough league opponents. They had no easy time with Monroe Catholic Central, but managed to edge them, 52-43. Then the T.H.S. cagers traveled to Lambertville. There they met the Bedford Mules, and racked up their fifteenth win by drubbing them, 83-62, ending a very successful season.

In the Class B District Tournament, which was held at Adrian, Tecumseh gained a berth in the finals by edging out Hillsdale in an overtime period, the final score being 41-37. The game was highlighted by a miraculous sixty-five foot field goal by Indian forward Jim Wilson, which tied the game in the final two seconds of play. The following night Tecumseh lost the District Tournament crown to Adrian in a game which ended 39-27.

The 1953 season brought various honors to many of our players. Jim Wilson was one of three players from Lenawee County to be given Honorable Mention on the Detroit Free Press All-State team. Two of our boys.

Jack Greenwald, and Jim Wilson, received positions on the All-Southeastern Michigan Conference League first team, and Bill Benham, Bob Binns, and Wayne Patton were named on the second team. Bill Benham was chosen on the All-Tournament Class B team at the District Tournament.

Five Seniors and two Juniors received Varsity letters. The Seniors were Bob Binns, Mel Boltz, Jack Greenwald, Wayne Patton and Jim Wilson, and the Juniors were Bill Benham and Al Hart. Reserve letters were awarded to Tom Baldwin, Jerry Barron, Jack Betzoldt, Doug Hooton, and Al Vanderpool.

The Reserve Team, under the able supervision of Coach Murdoch, had a fair season, losing a number of close games. They managed to win only four games, while losing twelve. Nevertheless, they progressed greatly through-out the season, and there are quite a number of likely Varsity prospects for next year.

TRACK

The 1952 track team was much improved over that of 1951. Of its four scheduled meets, Tecumseh won two, took second and third places in two triangular meets, and also placed fourth in the L.C.A.A. County Meet.

Tecumseh had an unusually well-balanced team, and the entire team and their coach, Mr. Lester Runk, are to be congratulated on a very successful season.

In its first meet, a triangular meet with Bedford and Hillsdale, we didn't make too good a showing. Bedford won the meet easily with $67\frac{1}{2}$ points. Hillsdale and Tecumseh had 24 and $23\frac{1}{2}$ points respectively. Bob Marsh led the Tecumseh scoring with 13 points.

In its second scheduled meet, another triangular meet, Tecumseh met two league opponents, Blissfield and Clinton. Blssfield won the meet with a decisive 87½ points. Tecumseh was second with 32½ points, while Clinton had but 17. Tecumseh's Jack Betzoldt placed first in the mile run, and Bill Benham won the broad jump.

Tecumseh placed fourth in the L.C.A.A. County Track Meet held at Adrian. Six teams were entered. Even though the weather was bad, Blissfield had an easy time winning the meet. Bill Benham and Jack Betzoldt scored first places for Tecumseh. The medley relay team also took a first.

We next met Hillsdale in a dual meet and won a close victory, $57\frac{1}{2}$ to $51\frac{1}{2}$. Tecumseh scored seven first places, three of whiih were accounted for by Bob Marsh. The others were won by Jack Betzoldt, Bill Beardsley, Bill Benham, and the medley relay team.

The track team closed the season by very decisively upsetting Morenci, who had placed second in the County Meet. Bob Marsh again scored three first places, and Jack Betzoldt won the mile. Jack was undefeated in this event throughout the season.

Tecumseh's top scorers in the 1952 campaign were Bob Marsh with 49 points, Jack Betzoldt with 32 points, and Bill Benham with 28 points.




CHRISTMAS DANCE
