For four years our train has made its way along the track, pushing and pulling to prepare us for graduation. As we started out, the trip seemed a long tiresome journey, but now it seems all too short.

In September 1950, a new group of one hundred and five passengers started out on a journey after choosing as Engineer of our train — Albert Hart. His assistants were: Vice-President, Joe Gregory; Secretary, Judy Sisson; Treasurer, Alroy Vanderpool. We chose Grace Moore, Dale Tingley, and Bill Benham as our Council Conductors, and selected Mr. Standen and Miss Cauffiel as our Firemen. Our first big stop was for the Christmas Dance, and later for the May Dance, with our candidates Joan Pafford and Alroy Vanderpool for King and queen. By this time we were well down the tracks toward our destination.

In our Sophomore year, with ten less passengers, we again boarded the train, and once more elected Albert Hart as our engineer. His helpers were: Vice-President, Russell McKenzie; Secretary, Judy Sisson; and Treasurer, Dave Frederick. Our Council Conductors this time were Janis Boltz, Paul Graham, and Patsy Purcell. Mr. Standen continued as our Fireman. The carnival which was given this year was the first one in which we had had a part. Our concessions consisted of comic book sale, bake sale, white elephant stand, and ping-pong throw. The main attraction at Christmas time was the arrival of our new class rings. During the traditional Sponge Week, the tables were reversed, and the girls did the treating. This the boys enjoyed to the utmost. To end this year off with a "bang" we were privileged to have our candidates, Joan Pafford and Bill Benham, crowned king and queen of the May Dance. We had an inside view of the feast which we would be attending the next year by serving at the Junior-Senior Reception. This whistle-stop tour completed our year's activities. At the conclusion of this year we lost our loyal Fireman, Mr. Standen.

Now in the fall of 1952, we were ready to begin our third year with only eighty passengers. This year as our Chief engineer we elected Earl Kruger, with Janis Boltz as his assistant. Our Secretary was Nancy Randall and the Treasurer was Mary Nixon. Our head Councilmen were Patsy Purcell, Paul Graham, and Alroy Vanderpool. Our new Fireman was Mr. Brazee.

Our class was honored to have our candidate, Doris Tressler, crowned as queen of the Homecoming event. The first mishap of our four year journey was the derailing of our train on April Fools Day, due to two of our chemists who were experimenting with butanoic acid. Our two passengers were unable to return to the train for a few days. Our presentation of "Jenny Kissed Me" was a smash hit. Our first big formal dance of the year was the May Dance with our candidates, Lorene Mack and Tom Baldwin representing us. We finally realized that our funds were low for the Junior-Senior reception so we got to work on fund raising ideas. Our Junior year was climaxed with the Junior-Senior reception held at the Tecumseh Country Club.

In this the final run of our journey, our passenger list numbered eighty-three. As our engineer we elected Tom Baldwin and Alroy Vanderpool as his assistant. Nancy Randall and Mary Nixon again took over their jobs as Secretary and Treasurer, respectively. Janis Boltz, Dale Tingley, and Alroy Vanderpool ably represented us at the Council meetings. Mr. Brazee and Miss Schell were our Firemen. The first big event of our Senior year was Homecoming Week. We chose Louise Duckworth for our candidate for queen. We were honored to have our float place second with the slogan, "We're expecting T'win." This year we presented another dramatic hit, "The Miser." Again we attended the Christmas Dance and next was the traditional Sponge Week. In May, we embarked on our Senior trip to New York City for five joyous days. After seeing many of the sights of the big city, we returned to Tecumseh, still too excited to be tired, to find ourselves preparing for the formal May Dance and the Junior-Senior Reception.

Then for the first time we began to realize that graduation was coming up fast and that we would soon be separated from our many friends and classmates. Our Baccalaureate exercises are now over and Commencement is only a few hours away. Our four-year journey is practically ended and we have reached our destination — graduation. Although they were hindered greatly by a lack of height, the team, under the leadership of Coach Victor Lawson, finished the season with six victories out of sixteen attempts.

The Indians ventured to Blissfield to open the 1954 season with a non-league encounter against the Sugar Boys. Getting off to a poor start, the Indians were defeated, 48-31, by a very tall Blissfield team.

The following week Tecumseh traveled to Hillsdale for a conference game with the top contending Hornets. The Indians were stung, 40-31.

After two defeats, the Indians' hopes were brightened by a 46-33 victory over Addison on the home court.

The next Friday the Indians hit the road for Morenci, and were turned back by the scrappy Bulldogs, 49-39.

The Indians, with high hopes, then set out for Monroe for their second league contest. After a fierce battle, Tecumseh was edged out, 51-48.

When Tecumseh met Clinton on the Redskins' floor, the Indians were knocked off by a score of 53-46.

Again the Indians took to the road — this time to Hudson, where the Tecumseh Five was victorious, 47-38.

Still traveling, Tecumseh met Bedford for another close one, but managed to come out on top 37-34. Good work, Boys.

Then came a couple of games on the Indians' home floor. But this didn't help against the Sugar Boys. They trounced us, 49-21.

Tecumseh really had a let-down when they met Hillsdale. After a close game all the way which ended in a tie, the Hornets pushed past the Indians in overtime, 35-34.

Addison was again Tecumseh's victim when the two teams met on Addison's home court. The Indians rolled past them, 67-59. This ended the out-of-town games for the Indians.

Back at home, Tecumseh met Hudson, and in a close one, the Indians were triumphant, 44-40.

Then came the powerful Morenci Bulldogs, who beat Tecumseh, 34-32.

Clinton was next on the docket. The Indians, hoping to beat their traditional rivals, were defeated, 45-32.

The following Tuesday the Indians met Monroe and fell, 53-48.

To finish the season, Tecumseh battled with Bedford and downed them, 39-36.

In the district playoffs at Adrian on March 4th, Tecumseh upset Monroe Catholic Central, 62-35. It was a very good game with all the Indians in their best form. Then Saturday night, March 6th, Tecumseh lost the crown to Blissfield, 43-34.

The Reserves, coached by Mr. Douglas Murdoch, had a very good season, winning 12 out of 16 attempts. There are some excellent prospects for next year on this team.

The 1953 track team got off to a slow start because of bad weather. In our four scheduled meets, Tecumseh took two seconds, a third, and lost one. Our first meet was a triangular meet with Blissfield and Morenci in which Blissfield finished first with 58 points and Tecumseh was second, with 47-4/7 points. Tecumseh firsts were taken by Leroy Betzoldt in the 440, Jack Betzoldt in the mile, and Tom Baldwin in the half mile.

In our second scheduled meet, a quadrangular one, we met three non-league opponents: Hudson, Clinton, and Addison. Hudson finished first with $56\frac{1}{2}$ points and Tecumseh was second with $48\frac{1}{2}$ points. Addison and Clinton came through with 17 and 19 points respectively. Our firsts were again taken by Jack Betzoldt in the mile, Tom Baldwin in the half mile, Leroy Betzoldt in the 440, Bob Binns in the shot put, and the medley relay team, which was composed of Jim Bowser, Bill Beardsley, Ritchie Davis, and Albert Hart.

Tecumseh placed third in the Southeastern Conference meet held at Adrian. Four schools were entered. Bedford took first place with 64 points, followed by Monroe Catholic Central with 53 7/10 points and Tecumseh with 37 3/5 points. Hillsdale, the other school taking part, finished with 29 7/10 points. Jack Betzoldt, Tom Baldwin, and the medley relay team took first places for Tecumseh.

Coach Furbush and a few boys went to Ann Arbor for the regional track meet. In this meet Jack Betzoldt placed fourth in the mile, Tom Baldwin placed third in the half mile, and the medley relay team placed fifth.

The track team closed the season with a loss to Monroe Catholic Central in a dual meet, 64 to 46. Tecumseh took six first places: Jack Betzoldt in the mile, Tom Baldwin in the half mile, Leroy Betzoldt in the 440, Max McLaury in the high jump, Bob Binns in the shot put, and the medley relay team. Jack Betzoldt and Tom Baldwin were undefeated in the four major meets.

homecoming


