Class History

The pilot signaled for take-off, and the 112 passengers tightened their seat belts. The main social event of this flight was the May Dance where John Cadmus and Wilma Bumpus were crowned king and queen.

After successfully weathering the first leg of our journey, we stopped for refueling and a rest. When the next part of our flight began, we changed the members of our crew. Those assuming their new responsibilities were: pilot, John Cadmus; co-pilot, Mary Pat McCann; keeper of the log, Betty Vargo; and purser, Roger Finnegan. Along with changing our crew, we also changed navigators. This time Mr. Shank became our beacon in the fog. The passenger list consisted of 111 students this time. To help us through the rough weather, Student Council members Merene Boltz, Wilma Bumpus, and Ed Lewis, were chosen. The high points of this flight were picking out our class rings and serving at the "Big Top" (the Junior-Senior Reception).

The take-off for our Junior year was a smooth one, with the controls handled by pilot, Sharon Claxton; co-pilot, Bruce Wright; keeper of the log, Betty Day; and purser, Roger Finnegan. Mr. Sherry, our new navigator, helped to run this flight without any mishaps. There were 99 passengers aboard our flight ship this year.

Our first notable achievement on this lap of our flight was the first prize, which we won in the Homecoming Parade, for our float with the slogan "Keep 'em Below Zero". Then one of the most able members of our passenger list, John Cadmus, assumed the duties of Student Council President, with Bob Benham, Shirley Larned, and Linda Beck assisting him as representatives from our class. To add new excitement, we concluded the year by giving the Junior-Senior Reception for the out-going Seniors; and we staged the comedy "Arsenic and Old Lace", which was a brilliant success.

After a brief vacation we resumed our flight on the final leg of our journey. We were capably led by the following crew: pilot, John Cadmus; co-pilot, Val Spangler; keeper of the log, Betty Day; and purser, Shirley Larned. We were indeed fortunate in having for the last part of our flight our able adviser and navigator, Mr. Sherry. This year our hard-working Student Council members were Betty Barton, Linda Beck, Merene Boltz, and Sharon Claxton. Throughout the various legs of our flight, some passengers had left us and parachuted to other destinations; thus, as we boarded Flight 1956, our passenger list totaled 81.

Again this year our float took top honors at Homecoming time, with "Let's Skunk 'em" as our slogan. This year, for the first time in several years, our Senior class sponsored the Christmas Dance which was called the "Snow Ball". Our Senior play, 'Blithe Spirit", was another outstanding feature during this last year. The usual dances and parties were held to add interest to the daily routine of our flight, but our Senior trip to Washington was the highlight of our final year. The Juniors, bless them, gave us a wonderful Junior-Senior Reception, which made us realize that our happy days at Tecumseh High School were nearly over. With our flight almost completed, we attended Baccalaureate services, and now this is Class Night. In just two days we shall receive our diplomas at Commencement, and then we will know that at last we are really "Out of School Life-into Life's School".


Penalties were handed out by the Student Council to those not conforming to the rules of Sponge Week; an assembly was held on Friday, in which the nonconformists put on a talent show.



Football

We started the 1955 football season out with a bang, defeating Addison, 32-0, on Sept. 16. In our next encounter, which was with a league foe, Monroe Catholic Central, we really played football for the first half, but Monroe came from behind to defeat us, 26-19.

We then went to Airport on Sept. 30; and again lack of second-half punch was the cause of an unsatisfactory score, ending in a tie, 6-6.

One of the brightest spots of the season was our encounter with Bedford on Oct. 14. For almost five years Tecumseh fans had not seen the likes of the blocking and tackling and plain hard football played that night. Bedford had beaten us in our three previous games with them, averaging 46 points a game, but finally the Indians delivered the football they were capable of and beat a tough Bedford team, 9-0.

However, that game with Bedford really took something out of us, for there was no football played by the Indians when Hudson and Blissfield took their toll, 45-0 and 53-0. On Nov. 4 the boys came back fighting, to be edged out by Hillsdale, 14-6; this was a paradox for Hillsdale had beaten Hudson the previous week.

On Nov. 11, the Tecumseh Indians, for the first time in about six years, came from behind to gain a victory. The boys got fired up and couldn't be put down, fighting their way to a 20-13 win over Milan.

Recognition should be given to Mr. Breniff for his outstanding work, and, with his help, we are looking forward to a successful season next year. Bob Benham, a Senior, and Allen Dickinson, a Junior, brought honor to themselves and to the school through their playing by being given honorable mention on the Detroit Free Press All-State team.



The 1955-56 basketball season was a very successful one for Tecumseh High. The Indians, with only two returning lettermen from last year's championship squad, not only repeated as league champs with a seven-one record, but also improved their overall record to eleven-five.

The Indians opened their campaign with an easy 68-37 non-league win over Clinton. In their second game they played another non-league game, in which they outclassed Dundee, although winning by only seven points, 47-40.

The following week, for their first league game, the Indians traveled to Hillsdale, where they were upset by a score of 55-50, this being the only league game that they lost for the entire season. Tecumseh's next game was with Blissfield, who beat us, 61-52, in their crackerbox gym.

For the third game in a row, the Indians were on the road, this time traveling to Adrian, where they were whipped by a score of 59-47. Following this, there was a league game at Monroe Catholic Central. We silenced them, 79-49.

The next week the Indians met Addison. They figured this game would be a breather, but they had to come from behind to win, 58-50.

Our fifth win of the season came when we defeated an always-tough Airport five in our gym by a score of 54-45. The following week the Indians traveled to Bedford, where we had to really pour it on in the last half to win, 48-46.

The Indians' big test finally came when we played Hillsdale here. After trailing by eleven points at the half, the Lawson men pulled it out, 63-60, thus keeping us in contention for the league championship.

On Tuesday, Jan. 31, we were defeated by Monroe High at Monroe, 56-43. Blissfield invaded Tecumseh next, and after a very hard-fought battle, the Indians succumbed to the taller Sugarboys, 53-51. Our boys let down against an invading Monroe Catholic Central team and had to fight from behind to win, 68-60.

The next week the Indians traveled to Airport, where we completely outplayed their boys, winning 63-42.

The last league game of the season was with Bedford. In an exciting contest, we beat

the Mules, 77-63. The same night Airport upset Hillsdale, to give Tecumseh the Southeastern Michigan League Championship, with a seven-one record. It was anti-climactic when we defeated Hudson the following week, 68-61, to end a very successful year.





The Tecumseh Indians did not have a successful baseball season in 1955, due in large part to the loss of six 1954 Seniors from the team. Thus we ended the season with a record of only two wins and seven losses.

With a green team, we started the season off with a 8-2 loss to Airport. In our second game we met a strong Bedford nine, who beat us, 3-2, in nine innings. In our third game Monroe beat us, 7-3. We stranded nine runners, which meant the game, this being our third setback in as many starts. they edged us out, 9-5.


