On the evenings of November 30 and December 1, "The Desperate Hours", a smash hit of the 1954-55 Broadway season, written by Joseph Hayes, was put to a test by a well-chosen Senior cast. Our presentation of the play, under the excellent direction of Miss Egan, was very warmly accepted.

This is the story of a home invaded and held by three escaped criminals; but it is also the story of civilized people being driven toward violence. The convicts, Glenn Griffin, his younger brother Hank, and his half-witted pal, Robish, pick Dan Hilliard's home as a hide-out until an accomplice can contact them with some money. The Hilliards are a typical family living in the outskirts of Indianapolis; abruptly, their pleasant home becomes a jungle. Although the crooks plan at first to stay only until midnight, they are forced by circumstances to remain all night. The tension mounts.

In the morning Mr. Hilliard and his nineteen-year-old daughter, Cindy, are allowed to go to work, to avoid suspicion, while Mrs. Hilliard and ten-year-old Ralphie remain in the house as hostages. Meanwhile, a police search for the escaped convicts is conducted by a deputy sheriff who has his own reasons for wanting to kill Griffin.

The trash collector, who happens to stop on his rounds, notices the convicts' car and writes down the license number. He is seen doing
this by Robish, who follows and murders him for safety reasons. The Hilliards are helpless until Cindy's boy friend, Chuck Wright, is picked up by the police and reluctantly confesses his knowledge of the strange happenings in the Hilliard home. Then, in a clever move the police close in, and finally, in a desperate dash from the house, Griffin is brought down by police bullets and the other convicts are taken prisoner.
However, before this happens, Hilliard is shocked to realize that he, ordinarily a mildmannered, peace-loving man, has almost given way to a savage instinct to kill Griffin when he momentarily gained an advantage and had an opportunity to do so.

Although finishing second in Southeastern League competition, the Tecumseh Varsity football squad was unable to do better than break even for the 1956 season. After dropping their opening contest, the Indians went on to win their next four in a row, only to lose their final three gridiron battles.

The Indians suffered their worst defeat of the season in the opening home game with Hudson on September 14, being beaten 24-0.

Recovering, Tecumseh trounced Monroe Catholic Central at Monroe, 19-6, for their first league win of the season.

The following week, in a home game, the Indians rolled over Airport Carlton, 28-6, for their second league victory.

Next, our gridders played Cranbrook at Bloomfield Hills in their only afternoon game. Playing their best game of the season, the Indians trampled their opponents, 35-0.

In another league game, played away from home, the Indians crushed the Bedford Mules, $35-0$. This win made both Tecumseh and Hillsdale top contenders for the Southeastern League Championship with $3-0$ records, but at this point, the Indians went into a slump which continued for the remaining three games of the season.

In their final out-of-town game, the Tecumseh boys were downed by a rough, hard-hitting Taylor Center team, 13-0.
The title battle with Hillsdale was the Homecoming Game and was played on November 2. Tecumseh fumbled away this game, 19-8, and as a result, ended up in second place in the Southeastern League.

Our boys lost their final game of the season, 12-0, to Milan on our own gridiron, on November 9 , ending the year with a four won, four lost record. Coach Breniff deserves much credit for pulling the team out of its long slump.

Allen Dickinson was voted the most valuable back, Ron Gurtzweiler, the most valuable lineman for the 1956 season, and Dave Merillat was given the Oil Can Award as the most deserving player. Ron Gurtzweiler won a place on the All-State third team, and Ray Larned received Honorable Mention.

The 1956-57 Tecumseh Varsity basketball team had a successful seaon. Along with Monroe Catholic Central, they finished in second place in Southeastern League standings, with a league record of five wins and three losses. Coach Lawson, utilizing the skill of four returning lettermen, produced an over-all season record of ten wins and six losses.

The Tecumseh cagers met their first, and traditional opponent, the Clinton Redskins, on home ground, and promptly exhibited their superior skill with a $57-49$ victory. Next in line to taste defeat at the hands of the Tecumseh quintet was Dundee, who was downed by the Indians, 59-55.

The following game was perhaps a prophecy of what was to come later in the season. Tecumseh, playing at home, was defeated in their first league game of the season, 55-45, by Hillsdale. The Hornets went on to become the league champs with a seven won, one lost record.

Rebounding from this loss, the Indians swamped Cranbrook, 64-38. Then defeat struck again. In one of the most bitterly fought games of the season, a fired-up Adrian team, in the last five seconds of play, managed to scrape by the Tecumseh cagers, 62-60.

In spite of this, the Indians continued to roll. They took the next three contests, all of which were intra-league battles. First to fall was Mon-
roe C. C. in a game which made basketball history at Tecumseh. The Indian ball-handlers set a new scoring record, racking up 89 points to Central's 66. Ken Miller set an individual scoring record with a dazzling 39 points. The ax next fell on Airport, Tecumseh edging out the Jets, $42-39$. The following week, the Indians also proved to be Bedford's downfall; the THS quintet added another victory to their growing pile with a $58-46$ coup over the Mules.

Then came a three game losing streak in which the Indians dropped two key league contests. This streak of bad luck was mostly attributed to the fact that two of the team's mainstays, Ken Miller and Bill Hansen, were not eligible to play in the first two of these games.

The first defeat was at the hands of Hillsdale in a contest which determined the league championship. The Tecumseh cagers, hindered by the loss of two key scorers, led the Hornets, 36-21, at halftime, but their opponents came back in the second half to claim the victory, 62-50. Albion, in a non-league contest, followed up the Hillsdale defeat with another trouncing. this time 74-57. In the next game, Miller and Hansen were back in the line-up. However, the team was not able to click, which resulted in their again being dumped, 51-37, by Monroe Catholic Central.

The Indians appeared to be on the comeback trail when they crushed Addison, 49-35, on their opponent's own court. In the next game, though, Milan traveled to Tecumseh, where they scored an up-set, skinning the bewildered Indians, 67-59. After this humiliating defeat, the Tecumseh five got organized and took the last three games of the season. In their last home contest, they mangled Airport, 69-47. Next, they tangled with Bedford and out-kicked the Mules, $64-61$. The final game on the Indian schedule was played against Monroe High School. The THS cagers soundly trounced their over-confident Class $A$ opponents, 68-41, bringing to a fairly successful close the 1956-57 season.

In the Class B District Tournament held in the Tecumseh gym, the Indians won their first district trophy in six years. In the first night of the playoffs Tecumseh eliminated Bedford, 4739. Then the Indians felled Milan, 50-44. Winning this one qualified them to play in the final contest which determined the class B district championship, their opponent in this game being Monroe Catholic Central. In the battle climaxing the tournament, Tecumseh staged a run-away, smashing Central, 69-42.

The 1956 baseball season was not a successful one for the Tecumseh Indians, but they are looking for better things in 1957. Last spring they won two games, while losing seven.

In the first game, a non-league contest with Clinton, the Indians were defeated, 2-0, in a pitchers' battle. The second game was a close one, with Monroe Catholic Central edging the Indians, 4-3. The third contest was another close one, with Airport coming out on top, 5-4. Next, Tecumseh was defeated by Hillsdale, 5-3. With a record of four losses and no wins, the Tecumseh nine went to Bedford, where they dropped a real heart-breaker, 1-0. Following that loss, the Indians traveled to Monroe where they lost another game, 6-0, to Catholic Central.

With the absence of the Seniors and Juniors on trips away from school, Coach Breniff used mostly J.V. players in the next game, the result being a humiliating defeat for Tecumseh at the hands of Airport, 21-2. However, this defeat
seemed to fire the Indians up, and they came back with their first victory of the year by scalping Bedford, 4-1, and continued on their home field with $\alpha$ victory over Hillsdale, 8-4. Those last two wins gave Tecumseh a tie for third place in the league with Bedford and Hillsdale. All three teams had a league record of two wins and six losses.

At the end of the season, Bob Benham, one of the three Seniors that will be missed by the team this year, was elected captain by his teammates. The other two seniors who graduated last June are Bob Manley and Bill Spreeman.

The 1956 Tecumseh track team had a full schedule of five dual meets, one triangular meet, and the league, regional, and state track meets. The Indians won three of these dual meets, placed second in the triangular meet, third in the league meet, and scored 16 points in the regional, which is a fairly good record, considering the fact that only ten of the previous season's nineteen lettermen returned to action.
In a poor start, the Tecumseh thinclads were crushed in a dual meet with Airport, 741/2-341/2. However, they sprang back in the following contest, defeating Bedford, 79-30. Then, in a triangular meet, Tecumseh edged Belleville for second place, while Milan ran away with first. Undaunted by their loss of first place to Milan, the Indians took on Monroe Catholic Central and ground out a 77-32 victory; but they in turn were beaten, $601 / 2-48^{1 / 2}$, by a superior Hillsdale squad.
Eight Tecumseh trackmen, in the regional meet at Ann Arbor, accounted for one first, one
second, one tie for second, one fourth, and two fifth places-a total of 16 points. In the Southeastern League meet, the Indians placed third with a total of $393 / 4$ points, but they were unable to place in the state meet. In the final contest of the season, we slipped by Hudson, 58-51.
Especially outstanding this year were Harold Weakly, who averaged 7.3 points per meet for a seasonal total of $653 / 4$ points, Ray Miller, who tallied $331 / 2$ points for the season, Allen Dickinson, who scored $33^{1 / 4}$ points during the season, and Ken Miller, who took first place in the onehalf mile event in every meet he participated in, except the state meet.

The 1956 Tecumseh High golf team, coached by Mr. Douglas Murdoch, had the best season so far recorded at THS, with six wins and four losses for the season, plus a first place in the regional meet and a second place in the state meet. A second team won all four of the matches which it played.

In the first match of the season, the Tecumseh golfers easily defeated Ann Arbor High in medal play, 170-231, but in their second meet, they were tripped up by Jackson, 338-367. Recovering, the Indians won the next four meets, defeating Adrian, 141/2-1 $1 / 2$, and Hillsdale, 12-4, both in match play, Brighton, 167-190, in medal play, and Adrian, $141 / 2-1 \frac{1}{2}$, again.

Then we suffered $\alpha$ let-down, being defeated by Jackson in a close match, $350-361$, by Sylvania in a tight contest, 354-357, and by Hillsdale in match play, 11-5.

However, in the league meet, in which Hillsdale, Bedford, and Tecumseh competed, the Indians copped the league championship and the trophy, with a dazzling 329, their lowest medal play score of the year.

Following this, the Tecumseh golfers took
first place and another trophy in the regionals at Brighton with a 356. Val Spangler, the Tecumseh golf team's number one man, was the second lowest medalist in the Class B division with an 18 hole score of 83 .

In the last meet of the year, the state meet at St. Clair Shores, the Indians again did a bang-up job, scoring a 347 for a second place tie with Grand Haven. However, Grand Haven won the second place trophy in a suddendeath play-off.

The THS second team defeated Napoleon twice and Bedford twice during the season, for a $4-0$ record.

Twelve boys played on the Tecumseh golf teams this season. The letter winners were Val Spangler, Dave Lamkin, Ron Gurtzweiler, and Dick Baker. Dave Elliott, Max Smith, Dave Champanois, Ted Kempf, Dave Rutherford, Dave Hohenstein, Gordon Greiman, and Ray Lasky played well but did not receive awards. Only Val Spangler will be lost through graduation this year; therefore, the 1957 golf team should have a very successful season.
