




What is the Spring Fling?






Heaven In Your Eyes


We're reminded how precious and special and valuable each human being is.







Dear Class of 2003.

As you may, or may not know, we the T.H.S. Class of 1990 are graduating this year. And as our beloved school days come to a close, we look back fondly on all that has happened and all that we've done. Believe us, it goes fast, and if you don't take a moment or two to look around, it might pass you by. Thinking of these things made us wish that we had had someone to help us out a little bit, give us some hints as to what was going on. And knowing that you are entering kindergarten this year, we decided that that's what we are going to do for you; submit to you a brief history of our class. He did a good job.

Before we knew it we were at a thing called Freshmen Orientation at the High School. Wow, was that building HUGE! Tip #2: as intimidating as it may seem in the first couple of days, the high school is in fact, pretty small. By your senior year you'll be referring to it as a "tin can."

Freshmen year: not only was the building big, the students were too, and not exactly rolling out the Welcome Wagon for us. So there it is. Our class history in a nutshell. We had our downfalls and made our share of mistakes, but for the most part, we didn't do too badly. We wish we had some parting words of wisdom for you, but we don't. However, if you remember one thing, remember this: getting there is all the fun.



T.H.S. social studies program has various class for students to take. The four required courses are Basic Social Studies, Career Planning, History and Senior Social Studies.


But there are plenty of other social studies classes such as World Geography, Tecumseh and Michigan History, World Affairs and Psychology.

Awards Night "Excellence"








Varsity Football Shut Doors







N Frosh Football Potential

The freshman team also had a stellar season finishing at six and three, while going three and zero in the Southeastern conference.









In addition to the fine regular season, the team placed no less than 3rd in the four invitationals that they completed in, winning the Carlson Invitational.



At the league meet they finished second, and at the regional a fourth place finish was accomplished without the top two players. Thus, finishing just shy of a berth in the state meet.






Wrestling On The Mat

"The team had a good attitude and they really worked hard," commented Coach Connors. "We had a positive attitude and I think that really contributed to our success."





All of this within a 23-3 season, breaking school records for total wins and wins in a season. (18)

How did the cagers construct this dream season? Talent, said Coach Ed Oxley, citing this year's squad as the most talented he's ever guided. Talent, as well as the team chemistry to bring it all together by each player accepting his own role on the team and playing well together.

The Tribe looked to the tournament with high hopes, drawing Chelsea, at Chelsea in the opener. It was nip and tuck the whole way, with Andy Poppink sealing the victory hitting a game-winning freethrow with :00 on the clock to give Tecumseh the grudge match victory, 56-55.

The team breezed through the rest of the District with little trouble, winning their 3rd straight District title in an 85-60 embarrassment of Dexter.

On to the Regionals, where the team had been stopped the previous two years in the opener. This time they would not be denied, having a surprisingly easy time with Willow Run. Next was Riverview Gabriel Richard, the team that had handed the cagers their season-ending loss a year earlier. Country Day. Picked as the favorite to win the 'B' title since the pre-season, the Indians

Tecumseh hung tough for a half, trailing by only 5 after 2 quarters. But, in the second half, Webber and Co. turned it on and the Tribe fell, 69-50. Some consolation came in the fact that Day went on to win the State title, and as it turned out the Indians had played them as tough as any team had or would the rest of the way.






