

Winter-colored balloons tumbled from the rafters in a mystical rain. The shower took place around midnight, just as the party was picking up.



"The difference between first and second is desire." With an outstanding desire to win, Joe Johnson makes a hobby of not only the sport, but also of bringing home top-ranking trophies.







Millennium

To better prepare for college during high school, is a good idea to do, if you have the opportunity. Advanced Placement classes are just that opportunity. In AP classes, you can work toward college credits without actually going to college. Because they are at the college level, the classes are more difficult than regular high school classes. 










Varsity Wrestling Making Magic on the Mat











Boy's Lacrosse Exceeding Expectations



Art Show Art for the Masses


